Utah Fatal Crash Summary 2015

Summary

Utah saw an increase in motor vehicle traffic crash deaths in 2015 to the highest number in seven years with 276 people killed, an increase of 20 deaths from 2014.

Some areas of concern in Utah during 2015:

- Traffic deaths increased from 256 in 2014 to 276 in 2015, the third year in a row of an increase;
- <u>Speed</u> was once again the leading contributing factor in deaths accounting for 37% of deaths. The speed category includes crashes where the driver exceeded the speed limit or traveled too fast for conditions;
- <u>Unrestrained occupants</u> accounted for 31% of deaths. There were 14 more unrestrained occupant deaths than in 2014;
- <u>Pedestrians</u> had an increase of 11 deaths compared to 2014 for the highest total since 1987;
- <u>Marijuana</u> is increasingly becoming a bigger issue with 38 drivers in fatal crashes testing positive compared to 21 in 2014 and 10 in 2013.

Utah made progress in decreasing fatalities in only a few areas in 2015 when compared to 2014. The only categories that saw significant decreases in deaths were:


- 9 fewer motorcyclist deaths;
- 8 fewer deaths involving drunk drivers;
- 7 fewer speed deaths;
- 6 fewer improper passing deaths.

All totals are based on preliminary data and may change slightly.



Deaths by Year (Utah 2006-2015)


- Deaths increased in 2015 to the highest total in seven years.
- After seeing record lows in 2012 and 2013, deaths increased 25% from 2013.

Deaths by County (Utah 2014-2015)



- Salt Lake (75) and Utah (38) Counties had the highest number of deaths.
- Garfield, Juab, Piute, and Rich Counties had zero deaths.
- Compared to 2014, Cache (8 fewer) and Duchesne (7 fewer) Counties had the biggest decreases in deaths while Utah (14 more) and Salt Lake (9 more) Counties had the biggest increases in deaths.

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Deaths by Month (Utah 2014-2015)

- August (34), June (31), May (29), and July (29) had the highest number of deaths.
- February (15), April (15), and September (17) had the lowest number of deaths.
- Compared to 2014, September had the biggest decrease in deaths with 9 fewer while August had the biggest increase in deaths with 16 more.





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
Deaths by Age (Utah 2014-2015)

- 22% of persons killed in 2015 were aged 20-29 years.
- Compared to 2014, the 15-19 age group had the biggest decreases in deaths with 6 fewer while the 25-29 (11 more) and 70-74 (7 more) age groups had the biggest increases in deaths.



Restraint Use of Occupants Killed (Utah 2015)

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


Pedestrian Deaths (Utah 1970-2015)

- The 48 pedestrian deaths in 2015 were the highest total since 63 pedestrians were killed in 1987.
- In the last two years pedestrian deaths increased 60%.


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Speed-Related Deaths (Utah 2015)



- The speed-related category includes crashes when the driver was exceeding the speed limit and when the driver was traveling too fast for conditions.
- Of the 276 deaths, 171 (62%) speed was not known to contribute to the crash, 81 (29%) were attributed to exceeding the speed limit, 22 (8%) were attributed to traveling too fast for conditions, and 2 (1%) the role of speed was unknown.
- In 22 of the deaths the driver was traveling 20 miles per hour (mph) or more above the posted speed limit. In 12 of these deaths the driver was traveling 30 mph or more above the posted speed limit.
- In 9 of the deaths the driver was traveling 90 mph or more.

Alcohol and Drug Test Results of Drivers in Fatal Crashes (Utah 2015)



- In the 256 fatal crashes there were 415 drivers, of which 62% were tested for alcohol and/or drugs with results available.
- Of the 259 drivers in fatal crashes tested for alcohol and/or drugs, 64% were negative for alcohol/drugs, 24% were positive for drugs only, 6% were positive for alcohol only, and 6% were positive for both alcohol and drugs.
- 38 drivers tested positive for marijuana in 2015 compared to 21 in 2014.
- 17 drivers tested positive for methamphetamine in 2015 compared to 5 in 2014.
- A positive drug test does not necessarily imply impairment.
